## Advocacy Updates: Homelessness and Housing

### State-level

Proposed Policy/Issue		Detail	Update
Homelessness	SB 912 (Beall and Skinner) Homelessness Programs and Affordable Housing*	Addresses our state’s affordable housing and homelessness crisis by making a one-time general fund allocation of \$2 billion to immediately house and help thousands of Californians experiencing homelessness, as well as hardworking low-income families most at risk of homelessness.	Amended. No longer a funding opportunity and not related to homelessness.
	AB 2162 (Chiu and Daly) Supportive Housing By Right	Addresses California’s homelessness crisis by allowing non-profit developers to build supportive housing without the prolonged approval process typically required in these projects.	Active, in committee.
	SB 918 (Wiener) Homeless Youth*	Creates an Office of Homeless Youth within HCD. Administers \$60 million in grants annually.	Amended. No longer creates an Office.
	AB 2161 (Chiu) – Statewide HMIS	Creates a statewide homeless integrated data warehouse with the ultimate goal of matching data on homelessness programs to programs impacting homeless recipients of state programs, as specified.	Active, in committee.
	SB 1010 (Beall) – Supportive Housing Pilot Program.	Uses existing CDCR resources to create a pilot program providing supportive housing and mental health treatment to paroles with severe mental illness that are experiencing homelessness.	Active, in committee.
Affordable Housing Dev.	AB 2035 (Mullin): Affordable Housing Authorities	Strengthens “Affordable Housing Authorities,” a critical tool for local governments to address the housing affordability crisis without raising taxes.	Active, in committee.
	AB 2923 (Chiu and Grayson)	Enables the construction of thousands of new affordable homes at and around BART stations, resulting in fewer cars and congestion on our Bay Area region’s roads.	Active, in committee.
	AB 2562 (Mullin) Community Development Loans	Creates more affordable housing across California by providing tools to increase financial feasibility in the face of disinvestment from the federal government.	Active, in committee.

### Local Efforts

- Emeryville's Affordable Housing Bond, Measure C passed. Measure C will:
  - Provide affordable local housing
  - Prevent displacement of vulnerable populations in Emeryville, including low and moderate-income households, veterans, seniors and people with disabilities
  - Provide permanent supportive housing for people experiencing homelessness
  - Help low and middle-income households purchase homes and stay in the community
- Oakland's Proposed Vacancy Tax, a special parcel tax on all vacant property. The measure would establish a new homelessness solutions fund for a broad array of homelessness prevention efforts as well as homelessness support services such as cleaning, sanitation, navigation centers, tiny homes and rent assistance. (Oakland City Council to determine whether this will go onto the November 2018 ballot. \*
