5. Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Update (Homebase/ESG Leads)

- The CoC is required to consult with ESG recipients within the CoC’s geographic area in the planning and allocation of ESG funds.
- The CoC’s ESG leads will provide an update on ESG performance.
- About ESG:
 - The ESG Program is designed to assist people with quickly regaining stability in permanent housing after experiencing a housing crisis and/or homelessness.
 - The ESG program provides funding to:
 - Engage homeless individuals and families living on the street;
 - Improve the number and quality of emergency shelters for homeless individuals and families;
 - Help operate these shelters;
 - Provide essential services to shelter residents;
 - Rapidly rehouse homeless individuals and families; and
 - Prevent families and individuals from becoming homeless.
 - ESG funds may be used for five program components: street outreach, emergency shelter, homelessness prevention, rapid re-housing assistance, and HMIS; as well as administrative.
